

## A Marker of Memory

On Sunday afternoon, February 13, a local committee achieved their goal of installing a historical marker on the site of Bloomington's first school for African American children, then known as the colored school. The site is now the grounds of the Monroe County History Center. Members Guy Loftman and Alan Backler participated in this Committee and our church made a contribution to the cost of the marker which reads as follows:

**By 1874, what has been known as the colored school opened in Center School here at Sixth and Washington to serve African American elementary students of Bloomington. An 1869 law had mandated education of colored children, with separate enumeration and separate schools supported with tax revenue within the common school system. The school building on this site was used until 1915, when it was replaced by the Carnegie library. Students attended classes at another site until the new Banneker School opened on the west side December 1915; the school remained segregated until 1951.**

Rev. Barbara Carlson and Rev. Mary Ann Macklin offered the following invocation to a standing-room-only crowd gathered in the History Center for the marker's dedication:

"Eternal Spirit of Compassion and Justice whose love is freely bestowed on people of every nation and color, we are gathered here today to remember and honor this place – this very ground where little children came to learn and where teachers came to impart wisdom and knowledge for living.

We remember with sadness, and for many of us, deep shame that these eager and growing young minds were set apart, segregated from the larger whole to which all of us belong equally, always have, always will.

Still we honor the courage, the stamina and strength and spirit that flowered in this place and that flows through the generations to the present time.

It is good to remember the minds nurtured here.

Let us give thanks for the lessons that the children received.

And may we never forget the lessons for us all as we honor and place the marker of memory here today."

### From The Committee On Ministry: Honoring Rev. Carlson

The Board of Directors and the Committee on Ministry are proposing that we honor retiring Reverend Barbara Carlson with the status of Minister Emerita. The guidelines from the Unitarian Universalist Ministerial Association (UUMA) state:

“The title Minister Emeritus or Minister Emerita is granted to honor long and meritorious service to a congregation where the minister has given devoted and competent ministerial leadership. The procedure requires a vote of the congregation to confer Minister Emerita status upon a minister. We recommend that the action be taken by a vote of the congregation as a whole during a formal meeting of the church membership. A formal resolution prepared for a congregational vote is one way to express the congregation's appreciation, and to create a permanent record of the decision.”

At our Congregational Meeting in May, such a vote will be taken. In the meantime, the details of a special Covenant between the congregation and Reverend Carlson will appear in a following Prologue.

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### From Our Director of Religious Education

We had a good time on Saturday night February 12 at Family Night. The children decorated cookies, had a heart scavenger hunt and made Valentine crafts. February 20 is Commitment Sunday. Children who are in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and older will attend the service with their parents. Children who are in the Kindergarten-First grade classes and younger will attend part of the service and then go to class with their teachers. Children in the children's choir will remain in the service to sing.

Part of our commitment to Reducing the Risk of Child Sexual Abuse in our congregation is to make sure that we have at least two teachers in every classroom each Sunday. We ask that parents help us by escorting the youngest children to their classrooms and picking them up on time. Children are not allowed to wait alone in their classrooms during the first part of the service. If your child is older and released at the end of class, plan a meeting place and if your child does not show up, please look for them. This coming Sunday we will have a lot going on and it is important for you to keep track of your child when they are not in the service or class.

Our congregation is a member of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), an association whose primary purposes are to serve the needs of its member

congregations, organize new congregations, extend and strengthen the Unitarian Universalist institution, and implement its principles.

Like other member congregations of the UUA, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Bloomington, Indiana, is an autonomous organization governed according to the bylaws written and adopted by its congregation.

A twelve-member Board of Directors meets monthly to set policy, address long-term plans, and manage the affairs of the church. The Board is made up of president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, past president, and seven at-large members. The Ministers are non-voting ex-officio members. Board members are elected to staggered one- or two-year terms.

The Council, made up of representatives from all church programming committees, meets monthly to coordinate the calendar and to foster communication among committees. A member of the Board, traditionally the vice-president, chairs the Council. --Paul Lane for the Membership Committee

## Expectations and Why I Make a Financial Pledge

Last February a pledge card came to me along with this realization: 5% of my income was \$0. Suddenly I had to do something about unemployment. I needed to actually apply for jobs, rather than just browse the want-ads. It was time for me to take action and grown-up responsibility.

I also considered the expectations I have of this church: I expect a minister to listen to me whenever I feel confused and need guidance—like when I couldn't find a job—and for that same minister to find someone able to continue listening when I have more to say. I expect Sally at the piano, Jen at the book table, Harlan in the kitchen making coffee, Lisa providing RE formats the kids will enjoy, Elizabeth greeting newcomers at the door, and Sue reminding us monthly that "This Little Light of Mine" is hymn #118. Most of all, I expect too many people to hug me, helping me to feel grounded and secure so I can start another week.

When I noticed all these expectations being met, whether or not I remembered to say "thank you," I knew I should put more than \$0 in the basket on Sunday morning. I decided I couldn't expect such wonderful works from these and so many other amazing people without giving my share. And I filled out a pledge card promising a percentage of my income—as soon as I had an income again. The stewardship committee understood; they knew I would pay someday, and were grateful for my willingness to contribute.

I urge you to take action and grown-up responsibility for your expectations of our community. Give as much as it's worth to you. And if you find it's worth more than you have, then just give what you can. We'll understand. So long as the basket isn't empty when it leaves your hands, our expectations will have been met.

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## Prison Ministry with the UU Choir

We invited Tom Yeiser, our congregation's new Sound Manager, to share his thoughts on our Choir's seventh annual prison ministry trip over the Martin Luther King weekend.

The trip to Wabash Valley Correctional Institution was my first visit to a prison, and I felt a great deal of anticipation before the trip, hardly sleeping the night before.

It is a bizarre place, fences, razor wire, and guards that seem like regular folks working a job. In some ways it is rather benign, almost clean, and very orderly, like my Junior High School. The racial mix in the prison population is stunning, almost entirely black.

On the return trip an IU student stood up to thank Guy Loftman for organizing the trip. He said it was meaningful as a black American, to see all the black men, and to be given an opportunity to reach out and suggest that there could be a brighter future for everyone.

We will never know the impact of the choir's visits services on the inmates, but the trip confirmed my belief that this society does not share opportunity fairly, or have a colorblind justice system. --Tom Yeiser

## O.W.L.S. Anyone? 7th-12th graders

Last year I had a wonderful experience with the 7<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> grade "Our Whole Lives Sexuality" program. Many youth were unable to participate due to the scheduling of meetings. Everyone has such busy lives. This year we did not offer it so that our youth would be able to participate in the "Coming of Age Program."

The Junior High OWL program is quite a commitment, 26 weeks for 2 hours a

week, but a good experience for everyone that participated.

There is also a 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade OWL program. This program takes 12-14 weeks and the sessions run about 2- 2.5 hours. The 10<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade program can be offered either semester, depending on the availability of trained facilitators.

If you are **interested** in or know someone who is interested in participating in either of these programs, **please let Lisa Minor**, our RE Director, **know** which programs.

There is a possibility of offering these programs on Sunday morning at the same time as church services.
