



Rock Indiana \$2 Equal Rights Campaign

The goal of the \$2 Equal Rights Campaign is to use \$2 bills beginning April 25 until SJR 7 is defeated.

Q. What is SJR 7?

- A. SJR 7 is a proposed Amendment to our Indiana Constitution that asserts:
- (a) Marriage in Indiana consists only of the union of one (1) man and one (1) woman.
 - (b) Neither this Constitution nor any other Indiana Law may be construed to confer marital status or any legal incidents of marriage upon unmarried couples or groups.

Q. What does "legal incidents of marriage" mean?

- A. It could be interpreted to deny partner benefits as well as civil unions. The right to adopt children could also be denied.

Q. This sounds like a violation of civil rights. What can I do?

- A. Write your state senator and representatives to express your concern. You could also mention the "brain drain" and the negative economic effects. In 17 of our states sexual orientation is included in the Constitution as a group not discriminated against. Progressive companies consider this a benchmark for whether a state is progressive in other areas as well.

Q. So this is a more complex issue than equal rights. But I don't get the \$2 campaign. Explain that for me?

- A. The \$2 Equal Rights Campaign, beginning April 25, is how retailers and others will know they are handling money in favor of equal rights, in opposition to SJR 7. *more on Page 3 →*

Notably for Newcomers




Despite its very strong European connections, that part of our liberal religious tradition known as Unitarianism is not a foreign import. (We'll discuss the

development of Universalism in a later column.) In fact, the origins of our faith began with some of the most historic congregations in Puritan New England, where each town was required to establish a congregationally independent church that followed Calvinist doctrines. Initially these congregational churches offered no religious choices for their parishioners, but over time the strict doctrines of original sin and predestination began to mellow.

By the mid-1700s a group of evangelicals were calling for the revival of Puritan orthodoxy. They asserted their belief in humanity's eternal bondage to sin. People who opposed the revival, believing in free human will and the loving benevolence of God, eventually became Unitarian. During the first four decades of the nineteenth century, hundreds of these original congregational churches strongly debated ideas about sin and salvation, and especially the doctrine of the Trinity. Most of the churches split over these issues. In 1819, Unitarian minister William Ellery Channing delivered a sermon called *Unitarian Christianity*, which helped to give the Unitarians a strong platform. Six years later the American Unitarian Association was organized in Boston.

Expanding the Circle

Open meetings were held after each service on Sunday, April 10th to hear feedback on the new two-services format.

Initial feedback gathered through surveys, interviews with

Ministers and Staff, and open discussion forums indicate the

following: The biggest surprise is that so much is going so well! Attendance is up overall, with the 9:00 service a bit smaller and quieter than the 11:15 service, but still feeling "energized" and reaching critical mass each week. Choir membership has grown and the music at each service continues to enhance the worship experience in the ways we're accustomed to. Religious Education for children is running smoothly with more manageable class sizes and effective teaching teams. Concerns have been expressed about the need to find ways of keeping the congregation as a whole more connected. Parking is still an issue at our very full 2nd service. Coffee Hour after the 2nd service is missed. There are challenges before us to build a volunteer infrastructure to support the growth of our congregation and meet the programming and fellowship wishes we express.
