Notably For Newcomers

In *A Chosen Faith* by Buehrens and Church, we find these

words: "Our growing awareness of the world as a global village requires that we seek to understand, and wherever possible, respect our neighbors' views. In each of the world's great faiths there is something authentic to appreciate and to hear."

Jacob Trapp, who had a long and distinguished career as a UU minister and lecturer and thinker, wrote that each of the world's great religions has a distinctive note, to be likened to the strings of a harp.

In Hinduism, he writes, it is the note of the spirit: a universe throbbing with divine energy and meaning.

In Buddhism it is the wisdom of self-discipline: quenching the fire of desire in the cool waters of meditation.

In Confucianism it is reciprocity: mutual consideration is the basis of society.

In Taoism it is to conquer by inaction: be lowly and serviceable, like a brook; become rich by sharing.

In Judaism it is exodus from bondage: the covenant of responsibility in freedom.

In Islam it is the note of submission: "Our God and your God is one, to whom we are self-surrendered."

In Christianity it is that all may become one: "This is my body broken for you. Inasmuch as you have done it to one of the least of these."

You know you feel warm and fuzzy as you wander up and down the grocery store aisles trying to decide - hummmmm . . . blueberry pancake mix or buttermilk, tuna in water or oil, cranberry sauce smooth or lumpy. Yep! That's because you're buying food to fill a Monroe County United Ministries Miracle Food Basket. And once again you have the opportunity to join in the UU food drive that shares our many blessings with families who are less fortunate than we are.

For the entire year of 2004, MCUM served 47,640 meals to 3,176 people. As of the end of September of this year, they have served 37,059 meals to 2,915 people. This is even higher than it was this time last year! In fact, to ensure they didn't turn any hungry families away, in July 2005 they were forced to REDUCE the amount of food given each family from a 5-day supply of food to a 3-day supply.

Be sure to take all the information you will need. And note: you may bring in your food baskets anytime before November 30. VERY IMPORTANT - PLEASE DO NOT PUT YOUR TURKEY, HAM, OR ANY PERISHABLES IN YOUR GROCERY BAGS! Place perishable in the church kitchen fridges. Looking Ahead to Commitment Sunday – April 2, 2006

Commitment Sunday is the time members and friends pledge a financial commitment to the Unitarian Universalist Church of Bloomington. For 2006, it is Sunday, April 2. The date is later in the year than in previous years. Reasons for the change:

- 1) It's nearer the actual fiscal year (we operate on a July – June fiscal year)
- 2) It's easier to keep track of which fiscal year pledge you are making, and
- 3) It's shorter for the budget process prior to the annual meeting.

The Board and Stewardship Committee anticipate a positive congregational response. Until April 2, think of the special gifts you receive from the church. Is it the Sunday services, Religious Education (both Children and Adult), Social Justice, Welcoming congregation, special events or something else? Each of us values the church in myriad ways. Be ready on April 2 to pledge generously.

Bylaws Changes Proposed for Approval at Dec 11 Congregational Meeting

AMEND BYLAW 4.9 BUDGET

Add the underlined sentence to bylaw 4.9: The budget is proposed by the Board and established by the Congregation at the annual Spring meeting, or at subsequent special congregational meetings prior to the start of the fiscal year. During the fiscal year total expenditures projected to exceed the budget by more than 5% must be approved by the Congregation. Congregational approval also is required for expenditure in

any budget line that is projected to exceed the budgeted amount by more than 10% or \$1,000, whichever is greater. Any mid-year changes to the annual budget may be made at the Fall congregational meeting or at a special congregational meeting.

Add: In addition, Board approval is required for all overages on budget lines.

REVISE BYLAW 4.10 COUNCIL

Amend this bylaw to match current Board practice.


4.10 Council. Representatives of the Church programming committees shall constitute a Council, which will coordinate the programming activities of the Church.

Delete: [The Board shall elect a member of the Board to serve as Chairperson of the Council.] Add: The Vice President of the Board shall serve as Chairperson of the Council.

REVISE BYLAW 5.5.3 VICE-PRESIDENT

Amend this bylaw to match the current Board practice.

5.5.3 Vice-President. The Vice-President, in the absence or inability of the President, shall have all of the President's powers and duties. The Vice-President shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors. Add: The Vice-President will also serve as Chairperson of the Council
