MAM's MCUM Musings

On a snowy day last Wednesday, I, along with congregation member Beth Hollingsworth, drove over to Monroe County United Ministries (MCUM). We took a tour of the building, and we learned about MCUM's programs and resources. MCUM operates two main programs for Monroe County residents: emergency assistance to families experiencing a financial crisis, and subsidized childcare for low-income working families. 70% of MCUM's support comes from the local community. Our congregation has a solid history with MCUM. Our annual holiday food basket donations go to MCUM. Also, in recent years the offertory collection from our Christmas Eve services has also been donated to MCUM. This year, we sent our most generous contribution thus far, \$1,071. Again, thank you all for your generosity.

Here's some specifics regarding MCUM's activities in 2005:

- provided affordable, high-quality childcare to 191 children;
- served two meals and two snacks to each enrolled child, providing 75% of their daily nutritional needs;
- provided parent workshops on topics such as safety, discipline, reading with your child, and employment issues;
- distributed the equivalent of more than 47,000 meals from their food pantry;
- provided financial assistance to 115 families in the form of rent, mortgage and utilities assistance;
- supplied 149 families with vouchers to Opportunity House, where they can

shop for needed clothing and household items.

I, along with Beth Hollingsworth (and others), are interested in strengthening our congregational ties to MCUM and the good work they do in our local community. Beth is currently exploring the possibility of creating a "Monroe County United Ministries Task Force" as part of our congregation's Social Justice work. Notably For Newcomers *UUs and the Bible* Unitarian Universalists regard the Bible as one of many important religious texts but don't consider it the exclusive source of truth, nor are we biblical literalists. Although UUs have a deep respect for the Bible and esteem some of its content as great literature, it isn't the central sacred text in our religion because we also revere the sacred literature of many religions other than the Judeo-Christian. As Robert Fulghum has written, "A religion is not contained in a single book; there's something religious in almost any book."

In many of our congregations, the Bible is read and studied as any other sacred text might be, from time to time, and not routinely. It is one text among many. We UUs believe that we should read the Bible as we read other literary material -- with reason and a critical eye.

We hold that revelation is not sealed (and therefore not definitively reportable), but is ongoing. UUs aspire to truth as wide as our investigations and imaginations will allow. We seek to find the truth anywhere, universally, not in a single book.

Note From The President:

On Wednesday, January 18th, the Board watched a DVD produced by the UUA about four congregations that are considered to be "breakthrough congregations". The congregations were chosen not only because of their growth but also by the energy and commitment of their members. Interestingly, one of the congregations, the First Unitarian in Dallas, Texas, is now the home of one of our former ministers, Laurel Hallman.

The UUA has encouraged congregations to copy and distribute this DVD so others can be inspired by learning more about them. Copies are available to borrow to watch and share with others. If you or your group would like to borrow one, please contact our church office.

Of the many reports we received for the January board meeting, one was from Rev. Emily Manvel Leite. Rev. Leite has been assisting the church in a variety of ways. There has been some confusion regarding her position. In Rev. Leite's report, she explained that she had recently created an analogy to help clarify what her position is here at the church. Rev. Leite wrote:

I am hired on a contract basis to provide specific services to the church. which include Family Worship services, occasional Sunday morning services, and leadership in Adult Religious Education. Being hired by contract is similar to hiring a carpenter in your home: you hire her or him for a specific project, with a specific end point. You hire a carpenter because you do not have time to do the work vourself and/or because are unable to do this type of work. You dictate the general shape of the project, but the methods of work are the responsibility of the carpenter, using his or her expertise. Each job has a clear end, but the end of one job doesn't preclude

your hiring the carpenter for another task. Thinking of my work at UU Church of Bloomington as parallel to that of a carpenter has helped to clarify how I work with the ministers of the church and also the nature of my relationship with the congregation. I am not one of the ministers of the church, but an outside minister hired to provide specific services as the needs of the ministers dictate.

In my conversations with people, I assure them that while I am hired on a contract basis, my family is a part of this religious community and that we have found a religious home here. That means that I am open to being hired for future projects, and that I will continue to be around, but at the moment, no one knows what our shared future will bring. For the most part, this seems to reassure people that I am not about to disappear when my contract is concluded, but to clarify that any future professional role in the congregation has not been decided upon.

I thank Rev. Leite for creating this analogy to help the congregation understand her involvement and we thank her for all of her wonderful work!

Recent Activity of the Special Purposes Fund Committee

At the January quarterly meeting of the Special Purposes Fund Committee (SPF), the following requests were noted as evaluated and acted on for the most recent Quarter:

- 1. Receipt and acknowledgement of a donation toward replacement of the tree outside the circular window of the Meeting Room, from Tommie and Walt Owens.
- 2. Request for and support of the UU consultant Rev. Barbara Child, for the Vision and Planning program. A portion of this support is coming from the Robert Carter funds to support visiting ministers, because Rev. Child will be our guest in the pulpit on Feb. 12. The balance of the support came from the SPF General Endowment Funds.
- 3. Request for and support of the UU consultant Rev. M'ellen Kennedy, for the Small Group Ministries program. A portion of this support came from the Small Group Ministry budget in the Operating Budget, a portion came as a special gift to the SPF from Chris

and Anne Haynes, and the balance came from the SPF General Endowment Funds.

Frances Luckett Fund - Special expenses to make our property and programs more accessible to the physically handicapped; making the North side of the church more wheelchair accessible after completion of the Hwy 46 bypass construction; support of headsets for the hearing impaired and large print hymnals for the visually impaired.
