From the Ministers:

Almost Autumnal Greetings from Reverend Bill Breeden and Reverend Mary Ann Macklin. The leaves are beginning to turn, as too, our attentions turn to the world around us.

This past week many have remembered the tragedies of Sept. 11, 2001 and its aftermath. Some believe that the world changed that day, but perhaps it would be closer to the truth to say that this heartbreaking day showed how much the world needs to change. The ensuing five years have certainly provided evidence that many of the lessons of 9/11 have yet to be learned. May we continue to hold this fragile human family and the web of life of which we are all a part in the center of our hearts, minds, and spirits.

We have three items to which we call your attention this week, all three related to Sunday Sept. 17th.

First, our Chalice Circles Program which was introduced in the service last Sunday, and for which the deadline (more aptly stated *lifeline*; nothing dead about it), for signing up is this coming Sunday, Sept. 17th. We encourage you to participate (mail in your registration form, bring it to the church or fill the form on the web). Life is too short to pass up the opportunity to build community and friendship. We believe this program has the potential to strengthen the spiritual vitality of our community, and we hope many of you will decide to get on board.

Secondly, this Sunday is a day when many of the religious communities in Bloomington and around the United States are focusing on the disastrous genocide in Darfur. We are displaying a Save Darfur banner at our church this week. You are encouraged to call our elected officials, including our President, who stated as a candidate that such genocide would never happen on his watch. We, as a

religious community, need to say, "NOT ON OUR WATCH!!!!" If you want detailed information, visit the following website, www.SaveDarfur.org.

Finally, this Sunday, Sept 17th at 7:00 p.m. there will be a free screening of the film, "The Ground Truth". This is a documentary about the war in Iraq and those who have fought in it. Our media outlets give us a steady spate of nice profiles of soldiers in the war, which usually end with a neatly scripted statement of being "proud to serve their country and protect the freedom of those at home." There are other voices to which we should listen as well. It is reported that 30% or returning Iraq veterans suffer from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. Tens of thousands have been wounded in body, mind and spirit.

"The Ground Truth" tells the stories of some of these veterans. Charlie Anderson, a Marine veteran who served in a Tank Brigade in Iraq, will be here to introduce the film. This film is a clarion call for this nation to honor the veterans by providing them with the support necessary to reclaim their lives. We encourage you to attend. The film received acclaim from viewers at the Sundance Film Festival as is being screened in more than 30 cities nationwide this weekend. It is rated "R". It is about war and its aftermath. We invite you to see it.

There is much suffering in the world.
There is as much, if not more, love in the world.
May we find the strength of love, and the courage to harness the power therein to change the world for the better.
