When you receive this newsletter, the Equinox will be at hand with spring in its palm. During this season, Reverend Breeden and I receive a myriad of requests for weddings, commitment ceremonies, baby dedications and other rites of passage that bring together human beings in new relational endeavors. The rites of spring! In the months ahead, I will visit with numerous couples for pre-marital counseling and other relational matters: the message of balance often finds its way into our conversations. In this time of Equinox, I wanted to share a few messages of balance which I have personally found helpful. First, it is suggested that four compliments accompany every one critique offered to another person. Couples who practice this balance of critique and compliments report more couple satisfaction. Too often compliments are assumed by the speaker and not spoken. Whether with family, friends or others, we all need to hear positive remarks to balance the negative in our lives...like daffodils stretching to grow; a lot of sunshine is needed to go with the intermittent clouds. May the force of balance be with you.

There will be two information sessions sponsored by the Governance Task Force to present the basics of the new governance structure and to present the changes to the Bylaws that will facilitate the new leadership model.

The information sessions will be held Sunday, March 23, from 10:15 to 11 am in the Library, and Sunday, April 13, from 10:15 to 11 am in the Library.

Governance Task Force Report to the Congregation

There will be three components of the policy governance structure.

A. A seven member Board of Directors with staggered two year terms - renewable once

Vice President

Secretary

Treasurer

Three At Large Members

The President and Vice President may serve only one two year term in these offices.

The Co-Ministers are ex-officio members of the Board. During even numbered years, three members will be nominated, (President, Vice President and one At Large member). During odd numbered years four members will be nominated (Secretary, Treasurer, and two At Large members). Board members will be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Congregation. The Board will meet at least monthly. There will be

committees of the Board: Finance and Planned Giving, Personnel, Shaping Our Future Together, and others as the board determines. The three non-board members of the Nominating Committee and the three non-board members of the Special Purposes Funds Committee are elected by the Congregation.

The primary role of the Board will be to care for the temporal and spiritual health of the Congregation. The Board will set policy with end objectives and executive limitations, and will monitor compliance.

 - 1. Seven members representing the committee groupings

- 2. A Board Representative
- 3. The entire Management Team which will facilitate the Program Team

The seven representatives of the Program Team will be selected by the Nominating Committee in collaboration with the Co-Ministers. The Program Team will meet a minimum of six times a year.

The Program Team will operate within policy guidelines and procedures set by the Board to create church programming and to facilitate communication and collaboration among committees and task forces of the church.

C. A Management Team consisting of the Co-Ministers and the Church Administrator.

The Management Team will operate within policy guidelines and procedures set by the Board, to manage the daily operations of the Church.
