## Rinpoche Speaks Here March 31

Drupon Rinchen Dorjee Rinpoche, a Retreat Master born in Tibet, who has accomplished seven years of retreat partly in Lapchi, the site of sacred caves where the great Yogi Milarepa practiced, will give a talk titled "The Mind of Enlightenment" here in our Library on Tuesday, March 31 at 7:30 p.m. Unique and essential to Buddhist thought is the concept of Bodhichitta, the mind of Enlightenment. Here, one not only wishes that all beings have happiness and be free from suffering, but one also wishes that all beings will ultimately be liberated from the suffering of Cyclic Existence. If we practice Bodhichitta with a clear understanding of the interdependence of all phenomena, this will result in lasting happiness for ourselves and others.

### Religious Education Helping Hands



Most of our Religious Education classes start out their class on Sunday morning with these chalice lighting words; "

*We are Unitarian Universalists, This is the church of the open mind, of the loving heart, of the helping hands, together we care for our earth and work for peace and friendship in our world.*"

On Sunday, March 15, children in Religious Education (RE) used their helping hands to make children's goody bags for Shalom Community Center, a day program that serves families at risk of homelessness in Monroe County. Participants in vacation RE decorated paper bags and filled them with a juice box, granola bar, pretzels, crayons, notepad and stickers. Shalom Center will distribute the bags to families that come to access resources there; often these families are in crisis.

Together our kids made 200 bags, and all of the children in preschool through eighth grade participated. Children can feel empowered by working to make a difference for others. My financial giving is doing my part; but more than that it is an affirmation of the abundance that is only possible through generosity.
