What are your plans? *My plans are a nebulous cloud. I am going to have 4 and 1/2 months during which I will not have a single meeting that I am required to attend. I will play some golf, work on cars, do some things around our homestead that I have not found time to do, and I will do some travelling. I am leaning toward driving to central America. I have been offered housing off the coast of Mexico and in Costa Rica. I would also like to visit Cuba. I expect to be out of the country for two months or so. Glenda will be with me for a few weeks.*

What are your goals? *"Sabbatical" means "rest." My goal is to rest from what I have been doing for the past several years.*

Will you be in touch with the congregation? *I will not be in "contact" with the congregation as such. There is a possibility that I will post some notes on line about my travel, but I will not make a job of it. It should be said however, that I will carry this congregation in my heart and thus will be "in touch" at all times.*


