## Monroe County Religious Leaders

Monroe County Religious Leaders (MCRL) includes representatives from Buddhist, Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Baha'i, and Unitarian Universalist faiths. We meet monthly to *advocate for the religious principles of mercy, peace, social and economic justice, and stewardship of the earth*. Both clergy and lay leaders participate and visitors are always welcome at our meetings on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday, 10:30 a.m. at Monroe County United Ministries.

### Actions taken include:

Meeting with congressional members to discuss health care, the environment, the wars, and civil liberties

Meeting with the sheriff to assure that clergy of all faiths have access to meet with prisoners

Meeting with local school superintendents to discuss issues of bullying and expressions of religion in schools

Representing an interfaith solidarity in response to hate crimes

Addressing *Islamophobia* through newspaper articles and a series of events with the Islamic Center and community at large

Raising awareness and funds for Volunteers in Medicine through an interfaith fund drive

Studying the impact of the privatization of human services on our most vulnerable citizens and the agencies that serve them, and working for constructive change

Programs have included collaborating with Trinity Episcopal Church in their interfaith project to develop Emergency Winter Shelter for the homeless (UU volunteers are needed.); extending EarthCare Bloomington statewide; and Dr. Rob Stone on health care plans. We have invited Senator Richard Lugar and Congressman Baron Hill to meet with us to discuss health care, climate issues, nuclear non-proliferation, and other vital matters.

Byron Bangert and I serve as Co-Conveners for this interfaith group. Thanks to all who participate and support our work! In the faith,

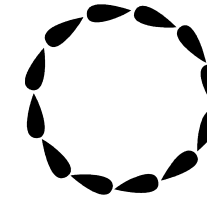

### A Space for Human Growth

Being part of a Chalice Circle was one of the best things in my life this past year. When our group started we shared reasons for joining. We wanted to meet people outside



the workplace, hoped to meet new friends. Some of us were experiencing the normal stress of jobs, new relationships, raising children and growing

existing relationships. Personally, I had retired and needed more human contact. And hey, UU people are usually OK, so why not give it a try?

At the start, no one joined this group of strangers thinking it would become an extended family. I don't remember anyone saying they joined to share significant parts of their lives and be a listener as others did the same. But that is what happened. It was magical and creative and very human. Our Chalice Circle was a space for human growth and healing. It happened for me and I believe it happened for others in the group. And, I believe all Chalice Circles have this potential. Why? Because the format of listening deeply allows me to speak and hear my own story, which is an intensely affirming and creative task. It allows the listener to hold the space for another human to grow. It is a practice that re-creates us all as more human, sharing another's heart if only for a moment. Though you may disagree at times (even with yourself!) you understand and see others.

So, our initial hopes were met and we found abundantly more. I encourage anyone who is attracted to consider joining a Chalice Circle. --David Parsons

## Attention Social Justice Leaders: Apply for Funds, Now!

The Social Justice Funds Committee (SJFC) encourages all social justice task forces, organizers, workers, and leaders to apply for our church's Fall Grants Funding. Below are guidelines from the application. If you have ideas about social justice projects and need some start up cash, we encourage you to be creative, involve the congregation in planning and submit an application by October 1.

Projects must be based in Monroe County and be consistent with the mission of our church. Priority will be given to applications from (1) Social Justice Task Forces, (2) projects that involve a significant number of the congregation, and (3) applications to seed new projects that will have an enduring benefit. Before submitting the grant proposal, advocates of the proposal should have taken steps to inform members of the congregation and to involve interested members in the project.

## New Year for the Women's Alliance

The Women's Alliance, an organization for women of all ages (and interested men), starts its new year September 3 with Cookie Lynch talking about the history of the Alliance in our church. Discover the many community and church activities the Alliance has sponsored through the years.

The Alliance meets on the first Thursday of every month in Fellowship Hall. Come at 11:30 with a brown bag lunch; program begins at noon. Dessert and drinks are

"Global Literacy" means becoming informed about what it means to be effective global citizens.

In October and February we will discuss what kind of programs we might want to support. In November we will hear Jason Blankenship, of the International Outreach Task Force, on programs for women in parts of Africa. In January we will learn about violence against women in our community. Hopefully by spring we will determine what we want to support and put a program into place for that financial and active support. In other months we will be hearing from members of the church community about their lives in the community and the church. Please come and join us.

Our UU Fundraiser grocery card project contributed \$6,000 to the church in the last fiscal year.
