

Age of Reason: Class of 2022

The Age of Reason Ceremony will take place on Sunday November 8th during both children's moments. This is a cherished tradition within our Congregation in which parents of first graders are invited to choose a book, old or new, to present to their child in honor of their journey of learning to read. As Unitarian Universalists, we value "the individual search for truth and meaning" and thus we recognize that the journey towards literacy is a major step in our children's spiritual journey, as well as their life journey.

This Ceremony was created by a former Director of Religious Education in our church in 1989. Yes, literacy is even more important for the class of 2022 than it was for those in the 80s, as they will have unlimited access to information. Children today are being raised in a media-saturated environment which is fundamentally different due to technology and the internet.

According to the Pew Internet and the American Life Project, text messaging, instant messaging, social networking sites and emerging technologies are causing youth to read and write much more than previous generations. Media provides access to other points of view and presents immense potential for improving global connection and understanding, but it can also reinforce negative stereotypes. Thus, these children not only have to learn to read, but they must also develop media and information literacy skills to evaluate and determine bias in information sources.

Within this context, our Age of Reason Ceremony seems even more appropriate

and worthwhile. Parents will present a book to their child as a gift, signifying their developing ability to discover for themselves, and our hope to guide and nurture them along the way. Will there be an Age of Reason Ceremony of the future where children are presented with an iphone or a Kindle? Today, we hope not. of drumming experience and non-experience are welcome. We encourage you to bring drums and other percussion instruments (instruments will not be provided).




Sssshhhhh!

Bazaar Frequently Asked Questions

What is the bazaar?

A major church fundraiser.

A lively community social event.

A tradition begun in 1959 when the women of the church needed funds to send the Rev. Paul Killinger to a conference, so, yes, this year is our 51st consecutive bazaar!

Why is it called an arts fair?

Because it includes a juried art show featuring 31 of Bloomington's leading artists in pottery, glass, fiber arts, photography

But isn't all that art super expensive?

No. Although many items are costly, one-of-a-kind treasures, almost all of the artisans offer gorgeous items for less than \$20.

How big is the bazaar?

The bazaar covers the first floor of the church. Artisans fill the Meeting Room and Commons. Fellowship Hall holds congregation-sponsored booths and café. Rooms normally used for child care overflow with books and the unexpected treasures of the White Elephant's Trunk. Our well-known bazaar attracts an excellent crowd.

What will I find at the bazaar besides art?

Gently used treasures in the White Elephant's trunk, homemade baked goods, cookies, used books, hand-knits, affordable gifts, yummy lunch and supper, and more

What is the Gourmet Galaxy?

A booth in Fellowship Hall selling wonderful home-made breads, pies, candies, jam contributed by the congregation. Donate your own signature specialties then purchase treats made by friends.

How does the Cookie Walk work?

Imagine 28 linear feet of freshly baked cookies of every variety, yours to select and purchase by the pound. The only tough thing is deciding.

How can I help?

Contribute baked goods, books, and White Elephants, and volunteer your time before, during, and right after the Bazaar. There will be sign-up sheets in Fellowship Hall soon. Most volunteer shifts last two hours. There are all kinds of jobs, but we especially need folks to help in the café (take and fill orders, peel potatoes, scrub pots, make change) and to help with set-up and teardown. Watch for information about each activity in the Prologue. No job, no contribution is too small. The Bazaar cannot happen without your help!

May I work more than one shift?

Absolutely!

Is there child care for bazaar volunteers?

No, but responsible children may work with their parents on a volunteer shift.

When is the bazaar open?

Friday, December 4, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Saturday, December 5, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

What if I am not a member?

Friends and newcomers are especially welcome to participate in all aspects of the bazaar: bake cookies, bring in your best bread, move chairs, assemble sandwiches, wash dishes. Working at the bazaar is a good way to meet people and help the church.

What does the church do with the money?

Our current operating budget depends on \$9,000 from the Bazaar. In these tough times, church fundraisers are more important than ever. The Bazaar is a fine example of how lots of people working together, each doing his or her small but pleasurable part, can combine to do something great. Please join us! 
