Away in a Manger Christmas Pageant - December 24 - 4:00pm

This worship is an interactive Christmas Pageant designed for families with young children and to those young at heart. There will be a few chairs set up, but we invite folks to sit

on the floor to create a more relaxed and informal atmosphere.

What to bring:

- a stuffed animal or doll to put in the manger and share with the babies and other children
- soft blankets, pillows or floor chairs
- a plate of cookies to share
- If your budget permits - a pair of new mittens for the Mitten Tree

Specific age groups are invited to come dressed for parts and to become familiar with a few lines. These ages are just suggestions, if your child feels called to play a certain role assigned to a different age group, that is fine! Please let Adrienne Summerlot (dre@uubloomington.org) know if someone in your family can arrive a little early and be an Inn Keeper and help pass out candles and programs.

0 - 3 year olds - Angels - Wear halos perhaps made of aluminum foil and whatever else you feel makes you angelic. Practice saying, "Oh, what a wonderful child" and "Peace to all people on earth!"

4 - 5 year olds - Shepherds - Wear shepherd hats like a towel on head tied with some type of rope or tie and whatever else would keep you warm if you were a shepherd. Practice saying, "Let's go look for that baby" and "Oh, what a beautiful child!"

6 - 8 year olds - Wise Ones- Wear crowns and other wise-one like garb. Practice saying, "Look at that amazing star! It must be shining for something very special!" and "This child will be our teacher."

9 and up - Inn Keepers- Help pass out programs and play the role of Inn Keeper. Please let Adrienne know if a youth or adult in your family can help in this way

Testimonial for UU Rainbow Rights Task Force: Phone Bank Calling for Freedom Indiana by Denise Breeden Ost

Here's something unbelievable: I get nervous if I have to telephone the public library. Actually, that's not as unbelievable as this: Last week, I volunteered at the Freedom Indiana phone bank, calling Hoosier voters to find people opposed to HJR-6 and transfer them to their Representatives' voicemail.

I signed up because I care. I care about my LGBTQ friends, family, and neighbors; about our Constitution; about marriage, families, and fairness. I'd already written to my legislators and the newspapers, and I wanted to do more. Besides, Phil Cooper said he'd be there Wednesday, and he's a really nice guy. So I signed up, and I showed up--terrified.

I experienced a warm welcome from people I knew, a short, clear training that answered all my questions, and a well-written script for calls, with a chance to practice it. My first full-length call-and-transfer still left me shaking--but our coach (Brooke Yarber) gave me a high-five, and didn't make fun of my nerves.

I got the hang of it after a while, and by the end of the evening I was tired but not shaking anymore. I felt proud of our evening's tally: 57 voicemails left for fence-sitting Representatives. I drove home still hearing the voices of some of the folks I'd called, in rural Indiana districts; one indicated an understanding that we should treat everyone the same, and another thought that gay families should have the same rights as other Americans.

This experience was a stretch, way outside of my comfort zone. But stretching can be healthy. And it turns out that stretching for something I care about can be deeply satisfying. So I'll be volunteering again. If you've been hesitating, I hope you'll sign up too. The more callers we have, the more difference we can make. It's easier than you might think. And who knows--it might turn out to be just the stretch you need.

A History of Generosity – That's My Church!

As our Stewardship Committee plans the 2014 campaign to address our church's financial needs and goals, we have reviewed the history of generosity in this church. "Stories from the Tree of Life," written in 1999 to celebrate the 50th anniversary of our church, recounts the efforts of our founders to provide a space for members to launch a Unitarian fellowship in this community. They started meeting in people's homes in 1949 and eventually held their weekly sessions at locations on the IU campus before renting spaces first on 4th Street and then N. Indiana Avenue.

They started a building fund in 1957, when the church had only 75 members. In 1964, they broke ground here at Fee Lane where they had been holding church activities in an old farmhouse on the property and built what is now the Religious Education wing. By then there were 152 members, so the generosity needed to purchase the property and construct the building was considerable. What today is Fellowship Hall was constructed a decade later, in 1974, despite a major budget crisis in the late 1960s.

This church has always prevailed--its members coming together as a community with enough resources to provide the environment and the ministry to fulfill its vision. The last major expansion project was finished in 1999, with the construction of the current Meeting Room. And the Green Spaces Campaign just a few years ago required another capital campaign to improve our campus and maximize our sustainability efforts. As we look to the transitions ahead, we can be proud of our heritage of generosity which has continued unabated over time with each succeeding generation. -- The Stewardship Committee

UU History for You Ernestine Rose and American Feminism

Ernestine Polowsky Rose [1810-1892] was born in Poland. Her father was a rabbi and very stern in his orthodoxy. When his wife died and Ernestine was 16, he arranged a marriage for her. She told the person that she did not want to marry him and went to court to seek her freedom from her father's control. She won and left for Berlin, then England, where she made a living teaching Hebrew and selling room deodorizers from floral scents she prepared. She heard Robert Owen, a Utopian socialist, speak about human rights for all regardless of sex, race, class, or nationality. She married an "Owenite," William Rose, and they emigrated to New York in 1836. They made a living with her sales of room deodorizers and his skills as a silversmith. She became an orator much in demand, speaking for the Abolitionist movement and women's rights to own property, hold a job, and vote. She was an inspiration for Susan B. Anthony, who had a picture of her hanging in her living room. She criticized those who used the Bible to justify

slavery and to oppress women. In 1849 she began a petition campaign to give women the right to own property. She succeeded in getting states to pass such laws. She was the first atheist to publically acknowledge her rejection of the supernatural, and she argued "all children are atheists and were religion not inculcated in their minds, they would remain so." -- Elof Carlson, Congregational Historian


