As many of you know, our congregation IS our budget. What we raise during the Stewardship Campaign dictates what programs and ministries we can offer throughout the year. If you have not pledged already, please take the time to demonstrate your commitment to the good work of this church. You can also complete a pledge card after either service on Easter Sunday, April 16.

If you have not pledged yet, here's what to do:

- 1) Complete an orange pledge card **or** the pledge card form in this issue of the Prologue, indicating the amount of your pledge, and return it to the church, Attn: Stewardship.
- 2) Submit checks to fulfill your pledge to the church either in the offering basket on Sundays or mail to the church anytime.

(Checks should be marked "06/07" on the memo line).

3) A pledge/donation statement will be sent to you four times per year to indicate your pledge amount and the amount you have contributed to date.

4) If you want to pay in advance, that is perfectly ok.

As of Sunday, April 9th, we had collected 237 pledges for a total amount of \$299,371. Of this amount, \$5,160 is in the form of new pledges. Many, many thanks to all who have pledged so far!

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



## Chalice Circles Small Group Ministry at Our Church Begins Soon!



You may have heard about it  
from Rev. Thandeka (the UU  
theologian), you may have  
read about it in *The UU  
World*, you may have heard  
about it from members of the  
church or from the ministers, or

you may never have heard about it. In  
September it will be here --- **Chalice Circles,  
the Small Group Ministry program of the  
Unitarian Universalist Church of  
Bloomington!**

Small group ministry is a movement that  
has been growing successfully in our  
denomination for several years. Now it's  
time for us to bring this wonderful form of  
ministry to our congregation. It provides an  
opportunity for participants to understand  
themselves and others by using a program  
designed to help each person develop  
deeper, richer relationships. Each Chalice  
Circle of five to ten people will meet regularly  
with a trained facilitator to nurture  
relationships, practice deep listening, and to  
reflect on what gives our lives meaning.
