Capital Improvement Project Update

Why do we Need Building Renovations?

Did you know Fellowship Hall and the nursery used to be a separate building that was completed in 1974? It was joined with the Religious Education wing in 1984 and the Meeting Room was added in 2000. The 34-year-old windows in the western façade of Fellowship Hall that face the courtyard have never been replaced and there are several reasons why this is needed. The seals around the windows are deteriorating and if you look at them closely you will see condensation and other signs of old age. In addition, that wall of windows has been identified as a major source of energy loss in our building by the Green Sanctuary Task Force. The windows let in too much sunlight which heats up the room all summer, and the old single pane glass lets out heat all winter. Can we reduce our energy costs and carbon foot print by remodeling that wall and the entry way? Could our community benefit from having a large room that could be made dark enough to do audio visual presentations during daylight hours? The Courtyard and Building Renovation Committee is hearing that we could. We would love to hear your input as well.

There will be one more information session on Sunday, April 13 from 10:15 to 11:00 a.m. in the Library, sponsored by the Governance Task Force to present the basics of the new governance structure and to present the changes to the Bylaws that will facilitate the new leadership model.

Please come and meet with the Governance Task Force to learn about the upcoming changes to our structure and to become aware of proposed Bylaws changes.

On Sunday, April 20, at 5:30 pm there will be a special Congregational Meeting to consider several proposed changes to the Bylaws that will allow the Church to operate under a new governance model of leadership.

Proposed Bylaws changes to be discussed at April 20, 2008 Congregational Meeting:

4.0 DIRECTORS

4.1 Number. There shall be a Board of Directors consisting of four Officers of the Church Corporation; the Past President, and seven At-Large Directors. The Minister(s) shall be a non-voting ex-officio member. All Directors and Officers shall be Members of the Church.

[New] 4.1 Number. There shall be a Board of Directors that includes the following four officers of the Church Corporation; The President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer, plus three members At-Large. Lead minister(s) are ex-officio non-voting members of the Board.

4.2 Term. Six At-Large Directors shall be elected to two-year terms and shall serve no more than two consecutive terms. The immediate Past President of the board will serve as a Director for one year following his or her term as President. One At-Large Director shall be elected to a one-year term and shall serve no more than two consecutive terms.

[New] 4.2 Terms of Office. The Three Board members at large are eligible to serve two consecutive two-year terms as Board members. Each member of the Board shall serve for the designated term or until his or her successor is elected and qualified.

[New] 4.10 Management Team. The Management Team shall consist of the Lead Minister(s) and the Church Administrator. The Management Team shall operate within policy set by the Board of Directors in order to facilitate and manage the daily operations of the Church.

4.10 Council. Representatives of the Church programming committees shall constitute a Council, which will coordinate the programming activities of the Church. The Vice President of the Board shall serve as Chairperson of the Council. *P. 6*

[New, replaces Council description]

4.11 Program Team. Representatives of the Church programming committees shall constitute a five to nine-member Program Team, which shall coordinate the programming activities of the Church. **Members of the Program Team shall be selected by the Nominating Committee in collaboration with the Lead Minister(s). The Program Team members will not necessarily be members of any of the committees they represent. The Management Team shall facilitate the Program Team meetings. A designated member from the Board of Directors shall attend the Program Team meetings. The Program Team shall meet at least six times per year.**

4.12 Reports (number change only, from 4.11)

[New] 4.13 The primary role of the Board shall be to care for the temporal and spiritual health of the congregation. The Board shall set policy with end objectives and executive limitations, and shall monitor compliance.

5.0 OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

5.2 Election of Officers. The Secretary and Treasurer shall regularly be elected at alternate Spring Meetings of the Church. The President and Vice-President shall be elected at each Spring Meeting. In addition, vacancies shall be filled at any Autumn Meeting for the remainder of the unexpired term. The Officers shall be elected from among the Members and shall take office on July 1 following the Spring Meeting.

[New] 5.2 Election of Officers. During even numbered years, President and Vice President shall be elected. During odd numbered years, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected.

5.3 Term of Office. The Secretary and Treasurer shall serve for a term of two years and until their successors are elected and qualify. The Vice-President shall serve for a term of one year and until his or her successor is elected and qualifies. The President shall serve for a term of one year and until his or her successor is elected and qualifies. No person shall be chosen as an Officer who is then in the concluding year of six or more consecutive years of service as a Director.

[New] 5.3 Term of Office. The President and Vice President shall each serve one two-year term in their respective offices and they are not eligible to serve in their respective offices for two consecutive terms. The Secretary and Treasurer shall serve for a term of two years and until their successors are elected and qualify. No person shall be chosen as an Officer who is then in the concluding year of six or more consecutive years of service as a Director.

Of Disruptions at the Peace Rally on March 19

In 2006 a Bloomington man was prosecuted for Intimidation and Harassment of a member of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Bloomington. A Protective Order was issued barring him from contact with the victim and with our Church. Our Church barred him from entering our property. Rev. Bill Breeden supported the victim and assisted her in obtaining the protection she needed. He also worked extensively with the perpetrator, trying to mitigate the damages arising from his acts. The man was not satisfied with Rev. Breeden's efforts or the Church's response, and has on various occasions expressed his dissatisfaction publicly. He attended the Iraq Peace Rally at the Court House on March 19, 2008, displaying a large sign calling the UU Church and Rev. Breeden fascists. We hope this background will help those who were disturbed by his conduct on March 19 or at other times understand the circumstances. We encourage anyone presented with such displays to ignore them, and not be distracted from the peace and justice issues for which people gather.
