Barbara Carlson also served these churches on occasion. It is good to remember that we are not just an isolated community of faith, but part of a growing community of believers in a better world for all the children of the earth. And it

is good to see the harvest from a labor of shared ministry.

On Sunday, August 10, Chalice Circles small group ministry was reintroduced for the third year. Everyone should have received a letter and brochure in the mail or by email about Chalice Circles. Chalice Circles is a program of small group ministry which enables us to know others and ourselves better by deep listening with an open heart. The groups are guided by a facilitator who uses written session plans. This year we have many new session plans available. Please see below for sample topics.

This is a great way to meet new people from our church community and get to know yourself and others better.

Abdullatif Mohammed is a 29 year-old Iraqi refugee with Ewing's sarcoma, a form of cancer. When he became ill, he and his sister Nada went to London and were told he urgently needed proton therapy. Since his arrival in Bloomington in late June, his physical condition has improved, but the family's financial situation has become dire. Our ministers and members of the Just Peace Task Force have been among those trying to help with public (emergency Medicaid) and private assistance (for lodging and other expenses).
