From the Ministers

As autumn leaves begin to reveal their true colors, we invite you to turn inward and observe the authentic color of your own being. During this time of great economic and political uncertainty, it can be confusing for many to choose which way to turn. We invite you to find moments of stillness and balance in your day. To turn inward and listen that still small voice within. Slow the mind. It is this place of quietness where the discernment to remain still or go forward is found. Also, remember, to turn to community in times of need and in times of abundance. *Advance. To move forward.* Last Sunday afternoon a great gaggle of Unitarian Universalists gathered in Fellowship Hall and Hallway for the Shaping Our Future Together ADVANCE (not a retreat). It was a time of great turning and abundance for our congregation. As ministers, we were inspired not only by the number of people present and the amount of pizza eaten, but also by the energy and myriad of motivating ideas that were shared. First, let us say how grateful we are for everyone who offered leadership throughout the ADVANCE: Melinda Swenson, Carol McCord, Bob Gonyea, Elizabeth Lion, Rich Janda, Libby DeVoe, and Jack King and all of those who have been either part of the Shaping Our Future Together Committee or the Long Range Planning Committee. And all those participants whether you were with us in body or spirit. Kudos. Blessings. Appreciation!

The ADVANCE, as many of you know, is based upon an Appreciative Inquiry approach to organizational visioning for the future. Appreciative Inquiry is based on several assumptions about how organizations function and about the nature of reality itself. In the book "Memories, Hopes and Conversations" by Mark Branson, which addresses the use of Appreciative Inquiry within congregations, the following assumptions are listed: 1) In every

organization some things work well 2) What we focus on becomes our reality 3) Asking questions influences the group 4) People have more confidence in the journey to the future when they carry forward part of the past 5) If we carry parts of the past into the future, they should be what is best about the past 6) It is important to value differences 7) The languages we use creates reality 8) Organizations move toward the areas where energy is focused 9) Outcomes should be useful 10) All steps are collaborative.

As we said at the ADVANCE, change has already happened simply from the questions asked, the conversations spoken and heard, the stories shared. Already ripple effects from this change have begun to occur. Let us be in the present as we look forward into the autumnal season to see what further will be revealed.

Several excerpts and numerous questions were shared from the book "Dynamic Relationships: Unleashing the Power of Appreciative Inquiry in Your Daily Living" (by Jaqueline Stavros and Cheri Torres) during last Sunday's worship service. Here are three more questions from that book. We invite you to take these with you into your moments of stillness within your day: *What is it you really love to do? What would happen to your life if you got to do more of what you really love to do? What do you need in order to do more of what you love?*
