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## To Be Fully Engaged

New Mission and Vision Statements have been drafted, based upon the many stories and responses received during our Shaping Our Future Together process. The Shaping Our Future Together [S.O.F.T.] Committee was formulated under great care in an effort to collect the core values of our community. Stories from a vast array of our members and friends were collected over the past several years through a variety of venues, with the intention of determining all that is of worth. While we are continuing to grow towards a governance model that will sustain and support the needs of our active and growing community, we are fortunate to have a rich source of information compiled by S.O.F.T. that establishes a foundation for our supporting structure. The Board is now in the process of fully engaging by implementing this valuable information.

After numerous hours, the Board will soon be completing the initial task of setting policy to be used by the Management Team. Simultaneously, we have been attentive to areas of visioning and called for a Mission Statement Task Force of the S.O.F.T. Committee to review our current Vision and Mission statements and assess their alliance with the will of our congregation as a whole.

Our current mission statement (available on our website) was created 15 years ago, in 1994; experts recommend that mission statements be reviewed every five years. An updated version would be more applicable for our future endeavors. The Mission Statement Task Force and the Board of Directors worked collaboratively to establish criteria using the enormous amount of gathered information from all of you, to be used in the final draft of the Mission and Vision statements.

Multiple objectives were considered in the process of drafting these statements and we look forward to sharing these with you at our Congregational Meeting on June 7. Mostly it was important that these statements be useful, applicable and purposeful to the work and spirit of our congregation. Additionally, our Vision and Mission statements will serve as a beacon for meeting the needs of our community.

We plan to vote on adopting the drafted Mission and Vision statements at our June 7<sup>th</sup> Congregational Meeting, to become fully engaged with our purpose as a congregational community.



## Green Spaces Looks at Sound in the Meeting Room

The Sound Committee has

found that the quality of the sound in the Meeting Room needs improvement in terms of both speech clarity and music. In consultation with Tom Yeiser, our expert sound manager, the Sound Committee has been evaluating how to make these much needed improvements.

We have identified two primary areas that need to be addressed. First, we want to address the way that sound bounces around the room. While our Meeting Room is beautiful, it is covered with hard drywall which causes sound to reflect and echo, making the speech sound "muddy". As we move forward with our planning, the Sound Committee will work with the Aesthetics Committee and the congregation to find a sound treatment that will improve the sound and be beautiful too. Second, we want to upgrade our present sound system with additional speakers so that sound is consistently good throughout the Meeting Room. We are excited to be working with the Green Spaces Initiative, which has been developing plans for a remodeled courtyard and other church improvements. In upcoming Prologues, please look for more information about the Sound Committee's plans, along with other components of the Green Spaces Initiative that will bring vital improvements to our UU church.

## About Charitable Gift Funds

The purpose of the Planned Giving Committee is to strengthen and extend the mission of our congregation.

Most brokers, mutual funds, and some banks have Charitable Gift Funds. Jackie and I have one with Fidelity Investments. There are important advantages to such funds for charitable giving. Appreciated assets donated to the fund escape capital gains taxes. The income tax deduction is taken at the time of the donation to the gift fund. This means that you get both a capital gains and an income tax deduction. You can time your donations into the fund to achieve the greatest tax advantage for yourself. The Fund earns tax free income and can be dispersed to any IRS eligible charity at a time of your choosing.

These funds cannot be used to pay "pledges". However, this IRS regulation applies only to "legally binding pledges". You can use these funds to pay your church pledge. You can write on your pledge card "I intend to make a grant of \$\$ from my charitable gift fund. Please contact me if you have questions.

Many thanks to all who attended our congregational pot luck on April 26. In addition to the fabulous turnout, the food and conversation, the Sabbatical Committee, Reverend Bill Breeden, and Reverend Mary Ann Macklin reflected with the group on the purpose of sabbatical and Reverend Breeden's evolving plans for his time away August 1st through December 13<sup>th</sup>, 2009. In our religious community context, sabbaticals provide

- opportunities for intentional rest, spiritual and professional growth for the Minister
- opportunities for the congregation to grow as well
- opportunities for ministerial and support staff of the congregation to grow

Sabbaticals prevent burn-out and are a proactive way for congregations and ministers alike to maintain harmonious longer-term relations and offer us the opportunity for a mutual expression of the fine spiritual practice of GRATITUDE - whereby a congregation gets to share its gratitude for the minister and the minister is able to show his/her gratitude for the generosity of the congregation.

Reverend Breeden shared his plans for a journey south in to Mexico and Costa Rica and the possibility of a visit to Cuba where his chief aim is to step away from the schedule of his busy ministry. He intends to go inward; to be present to his journey without pre-conceived expectations for outcomes. Reverend Breeden will have more to share with the congregation in future Prologue articles and from the pulpit.

Looking ahead, the Sabbatical Committee is seeking volunteers to provide home

hospitality for returning ministers in October and November. ## MidWest Leadership School, July 19-25, 2009

This leadership training is part of the Unitarian Universalist Association's nationwide network of leadership schools.
