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MAM's Musings

As I noted in my brief reflections during last Sunday's worship services, Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. said in 1967, "It has always been the responsibility of the church to broaden horizons and challenge the status quo. The church must move into the arena of social action." This truth certainly holds true for us today as Unitarian Universalists.

Significant questions are, "What will this mean in terms of our faith formation? What will the next ten years look like in terms of our congregation's social action and social justice? How will this manifest in terms of our vision: *Seeking the Spirit, Building Community, Changing the World*."

Reverend Breeden and I are asking members, friends and staff of this congregation to mark your calendars for the evening of February 25th and the day of February 26th for an event entitled Faith Formation 2020 to explore these questions. Presenters Reverend Phil Lund, a former Director of Religious Education, and Reverend Sue Sinnamon, will utilize their knowledge of a national initiative to help us explore 13 trends and forces which will influence faith formation in the next decade. They will guide us in ways to prepare our congregation, particularly with our emphasis on social justice, in order to engage these trends in a dynamic multi-generational and spiritual manner.

The West Window

Today I had the joy of delivering checks to the Shalom Center and to the Interfaith Winter Shelter that will enable them to provide bus passes for the homeless in Bloomington. Those checks were made possible by gifts given in the memory of Dick Pfister and Cliff Baker, and by Zaineb Istrabadi, who donated her honorarium for speaking last Sunday. I dream of the day when homelessness will no longer be part of our national vocabulary, but I don't expect to live to see it. This year mortgage foreclosures are expected to reach a record number, even as there are signs that the economy is beginning to revive. Wall Street seems happy again while Main Street is filled with the unemployed, the under-employed and all the rest that make up the underside of America.

On this day after our honoring of Martin Luther King, Jr. I would simply like to share a few lines from his book, *Strength to Love*. "The church must be reminded that it is not the master or the servant of the state, but rather the conscience of the state. It must be the guide and the critic of the state, and never its tool...If the church will free itself from the shackles of a deadening status quo, ...and will speak and act fearlessly and insistently in terms of justice and peace, it will enkindle the imagination of mankind and the souls of men, imbuing them with a glowing and ardent love for truth, justice, and peace. Men far and near will know the church as a great fellowship of love that provides light and bread for the lonely travelers at midnight."

No doubt Martin would today use more inclusive language for it is both men and women whose hearts long for a voice crying in the wilderness demanding not only bread but roses, not mere handouts for survival, but a radical restructuring of society to reflect the worth and dignity of all. That is the challenge we face. May we become that transformational community of which he dreamed.

Speaking of roses, I invite you to hear the beautiful piano music of Orla McDonagh, who brought us a gift of music last year. (See BULLETIN BOARD, Page 9)

Going Going Green!

The U.S. Green Building Council's LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) program offers a multi-point rating system that organizations and individuals can use to evaluate and encourage the adoption of sustainable building and development practices. These principles are an important part of Green Spaces. Working with the Green Sanctuary Task Force, we are researching and implementing these principles and documenting our LEED-friendly actions, such as:

- Making improvements (like new windows and lighting in Fellowship Hall) that promote energy efficiency, while optimizing performance with maintenance on our HVAC system.
- Incorporating materials that are long-lasting, easily maintained and, when possible, regionally quarried or manufactured to reduce fuel consumption.
- Selecting building materials, interior finishes (like paints & adhesives), and cleaning products to promote occupant health.
- Setting and implementing a policy to purchase local & organic food products, Energy Star appliances, low-flush toilets, and low-mercury lamps.
- Auditing the current "waste stream" and continuing to expand and document our composting and recycling efforts.
- Designing new landscaping that preserves existing trees, incorporates native and low-water trees and plants, and engineering and re-grading the property to improve rainwater absorption (including building a rain garden).
- Increasing the use of alternative transportation, whether by car pooling, biking or walking to church.
- Seeking special innovation credits for programs church members are organizing, including the new Task of the Month program, and a planned effort to use plants rather than rocks (as proposed by INDOT) to cover the future slope at our By Pass boundary (working with people from IU and the City).

UU Fellowship of Klamath County, Oregon, Loses Building to Fire

The building of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Klamath County Oregon burned on Tuesday, January 4. The cause of the fire was accidental, and the building, valued at \$142,000 with contents valued at \$20,000, was a total loss. The fellowship is quite small, reporting 20 members (up from 17 members a decade ago). It was organized in 1957 at the height of the fellowship movement, and affiliated with the American Unitarian Association in 1960. The wood frame building, formerly Pine Grove School, was over a hundred years old. CASA Volunteer Training Coming Up in March

Stand up for abused children, so they can stand a chance. Every year, children enter the Monroe County foster care system due to suspected parental abuse or neglect. Monroe County Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) needs committed volunteers to advocate for the safety and well-being for these children in juvenile court. More than mentors, CASA volunteers are sworn officers of the court who monitor children's health and education, identify needs of the child and family, and submit recommendations to the court. CASA Volunteers work with professionals to help each child find a safe and permanent home. Volunteer hours typically range from 10-15 hours a month. Volunteers need to be 21 or older, able to commit one to two years of service, and have reliable transportation. CASA Volunteer Training: March 1-April 11, 2011, Tuesdays and Thursdays, 9:30am-12:30pm. Training will be held at One City Centre (120 W. 7th St, Bloomington). Application deadline is Feb. 18th. 
